



I do: Recognising notes.

When we look at money, we need to know whether we are looking at pounds or pence. Today we will be looking at notes.



I know that all notes represent amounts in pounds/£.

So for me to be able to identify the amount in pounds, I need to look at the numeral or words on the notes.

I can see the number 50 and the word fifty therefore the note is fifty pounds/£50 note.

You do: Recognising notes.

REMEMBER: that all notes represent amounts in pounds/£.



What note is this? What number or words can you see?

I do: Recognising notes and amounts.



Miss Wright has one £10 note, two £20 notes and one £50 note in her purse. I am going to circle the notes to show the money in my purse. I know I need to look at number on each note to identify them.

You do: Recognising notes and amounts.



In your piggy bank you have one £10 note, two £20 notes and two £50 notes.

Can you circle the notes to show me the money your piggy bank?

I do: Least to greatest



I am going to put these notes in order from the least to the greatest value. I know that the number with the least value is the smallest number- the number 5. I know the number with the greatest value is the biggest number- the number 50.



I have also noticed that the money increases in size as it increases in value.

I do: Greatest to least



Can you order these notes from the greatest to the least value?
